about going to Missouri,, he replied she could do as

she pleased, he should not be affraid to go there

and he that she would do well enough,, that

her husband was at home while she packed her

things to go, and he went to see the man in order to

get him to carry her down to Missouri but his folks opposed hid making a bargain with the man so she did not go the see him again but she went to see

him and agreed with him herself,, he carried her

down free,, took care of her during her sickness making

no charge,& he and his wife were like a father and

mother to her.. She was there seven months and did not

receive a word of inteligence from her husband,, at

last she recived a line from his mother stating they

had recived a letter from her husband that he was

not expected to come home for sometime, also that her sister was at Winter Quartes sick that her sister and

brother had gone from Nauvoo and they knew not where
